OVERVIEW

Required by the City – Each of Saint Paul's 17 districts must have a current plan.

Officially Approved – Plans must be reviewed by City staff and approved by the City Council and the Met Council before adoption.

Why We're Involved: Voices from the Community

"I came to the West Side in late 2021. I wanted to meet neighbors. WSCO seemed the easiest way and the Robert Street project captured my imagination, interest, and heart! It's a project that will make a difference in a big way — we need to get it right!"

For generations, they told us there's no money for the West Side. Now, with millions coming to rebuild Robert Street, we demand a project that creates jobs for our youth and builds a destination in our community—not just another road!"

"I believe we need West Sider led solutions for safer intersections and critical crosswalks to be given equal consideration in MnDOT's Robert Street project design. The process so far has not achieved that goal."

"MnDOT's Robert Street project is going to happen with or without our neighborhood voices, so please let us hear from you!"

How Public Input Has Shaped the Project

- Delayed the project to ensure community concerns are addressed.
- Successfully pushed for viaduct funding as part of the project.

What's Next?

- City Council Approval Required – MnDOT needs approval in Fall 2025.
- Your Voice Matters – Council members represent us. We must communicate our priorities now.

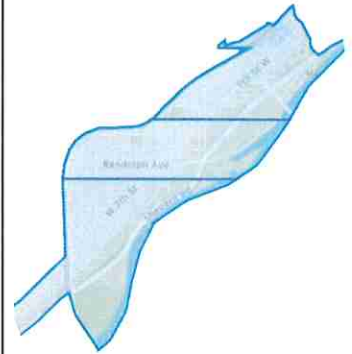

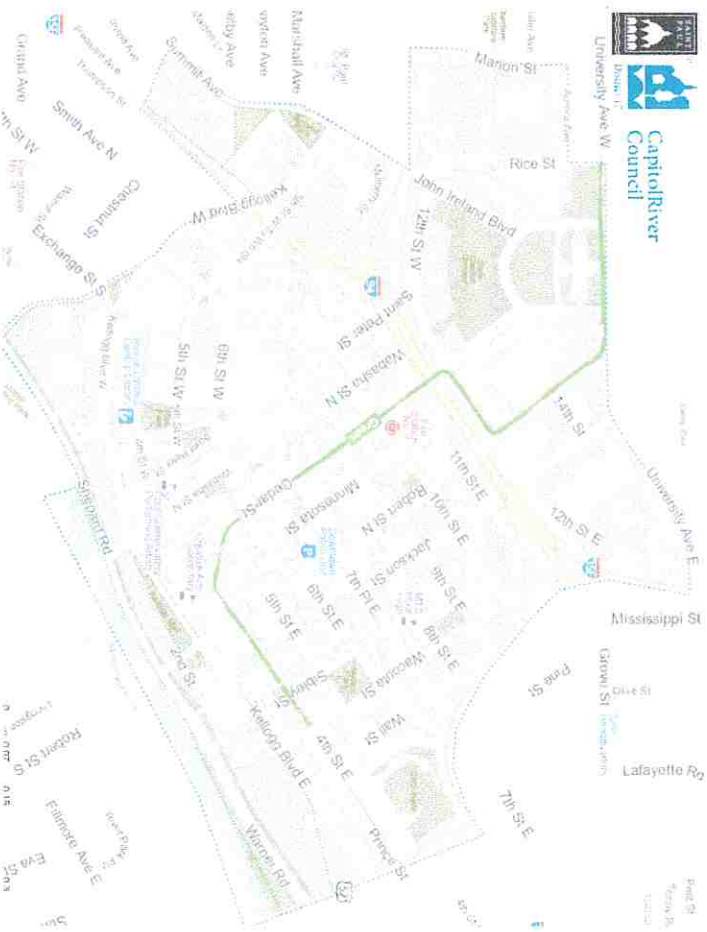
The CapitolRiver Council Annual Meeting will be on Tuesday, June 24, at 5 p.m., at Landmark Center.

CapitolRiver Council



Mission:

CapitolRiver Council, an official advisory group to the Saint Paul City Council, represents and works in partnership with all District 17 stakeholders to act on urban planning and community building efforts as part of a shared vision to support sustainable, safe, healthy, and vibrant neighborhoods.

Committees

Making decisions based on input from **ALL District 17 stakeholders** is difficult.

Committees are one way that we engage diverse groups of people in discussions on topics of interest. All committee meetings are open to the public and all are welcome.

The Public Realm Committee focuses on ideas for improving and maintaining parks and recreation, public safety, transportation (transit, parking, bicycling, pedestrian safety / accessibility, etc.), and quality-of-life issues that relate to public spaces. The committee is currently leading engagement activities to support the City's Streets and Sidewalks Plan process. **Meeting date: 1st Thursday of the month at 5 p.m.**

The Planning and Zoning Committee meets as needed, and it reviews downtown development projects to ensure benefit, sensitivity and compatibility with our downtown community and vitality. The committee also leads CRC's planning activities.

The Skyway Governance Advisory Committee makes recommendations on issues and policies overseeing the operations and maintenance of the skyway system, including but not limited to its design, signage, and hours of operation. The committee is required to make recommendations about requested temporary closures within the skyway system, and about proposed public arts projects. The committee meets on the 4th Friday of the month at 9 a.m.

The Arts, Culture and Events Committee meets as needed, and works to identify issues and implement activities that involve arts and community engagement.

Inclusion is essential

The focus of CRC's community engagement work is to improve livability in the Downtown neighborhood, and in the Capitol area (District 17). CRC facilitates participation in public decision-making by engaging residents, students, business owners, building owners, and workers in discussions about local issues, and about development projects that affect livability in District 17. CRC also develops recommendations based on the outcomes of community engagement activities.

Inclusion is achieved when someone with any kind of identity feels welcome, safe, and able to access the process of decision-making in our work.

- **Inclusion** is the intentional creation of spaces and services with diversity in mind, to enable all individuals to succeed and thrive.
- **Diversity** is the differences inherent in individuals. This includes, but is not limited to, ability (cognitive and physical), age, cultural background and values, ethnicity, gender, language, nation of origin, race, religion, sexual orientation, socioeconomic status, and the intersections therein.
- **Equity** is social justice, and the fair treatment of individuals, based on their individual and diverse needs, viewed through the lens of historical power structures and social norms.
- **Accessibility** is building equitable access to our resources, services, and spaces for all customers and accommodations where accessibility isn't possible.

Diversity, Equity and Accessibility are **strategies we use to achieve Inclusion**.

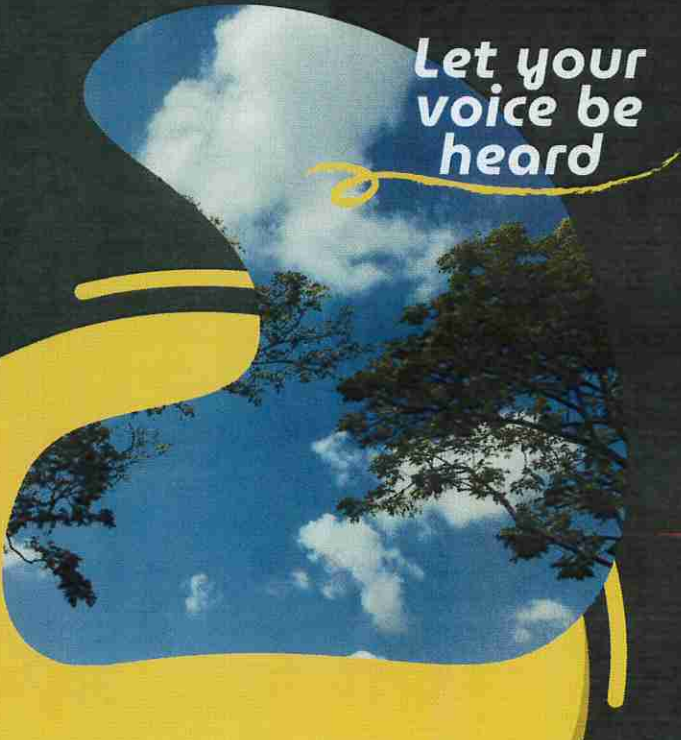

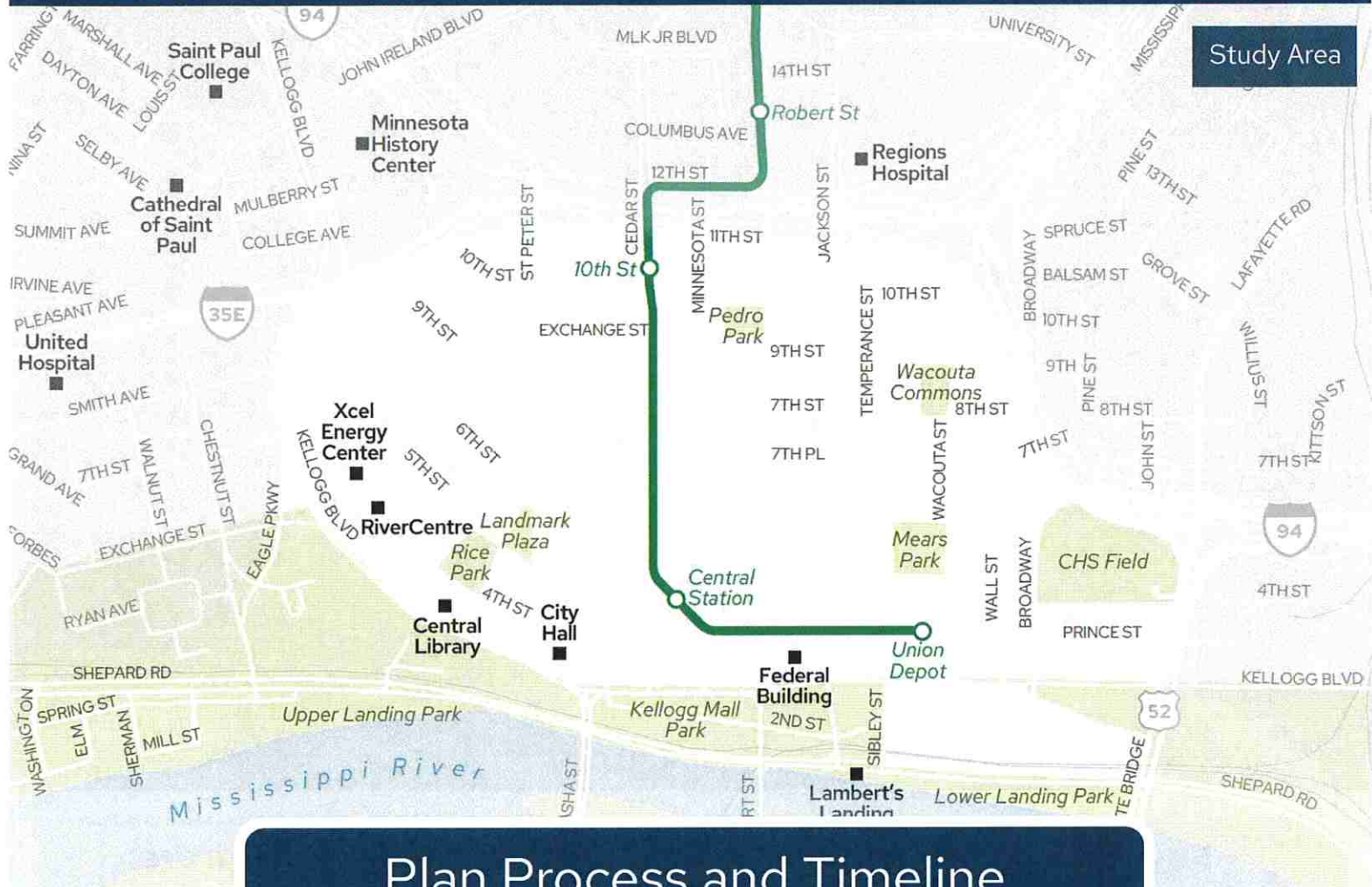

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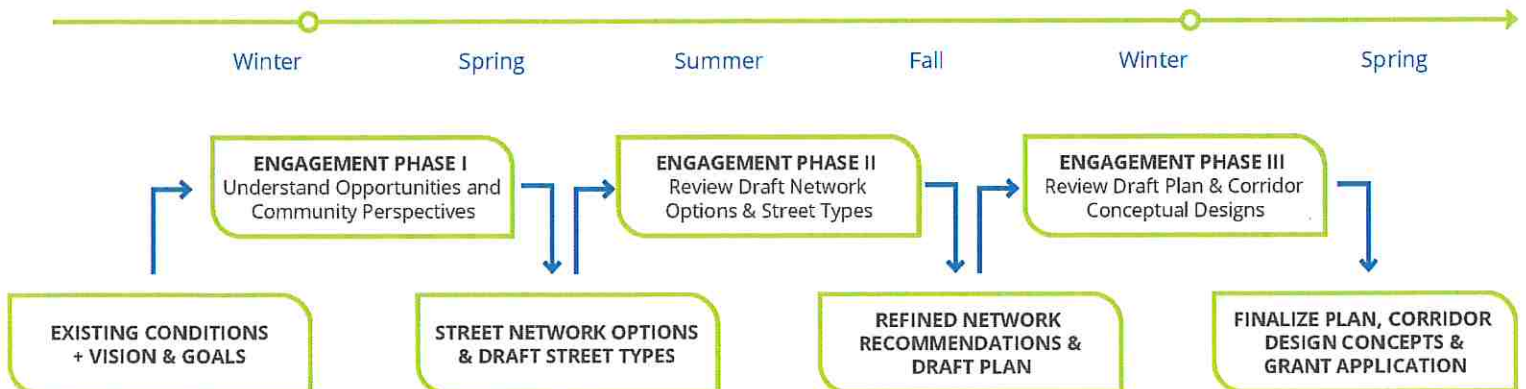

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Final Designs: 2025 Pleasant Ave Reconstruction

- Road narrowed from 17 foot lanes to 13 foot lanes
- Adding shared use path on south side of Pleasant Avenue and East side of Victoria Street
- Widening sidewalk on West side of Victoria Street from 5 feet to 6 feet
- Adding spot drainage mitigation on the North side of Pleasant Avenue and underground drainage mitigation under the boulevard on the south side of Pleasant Avenue
- Adding solar lighting
- Removing parking on Victoria Street and Pleasant Avenue

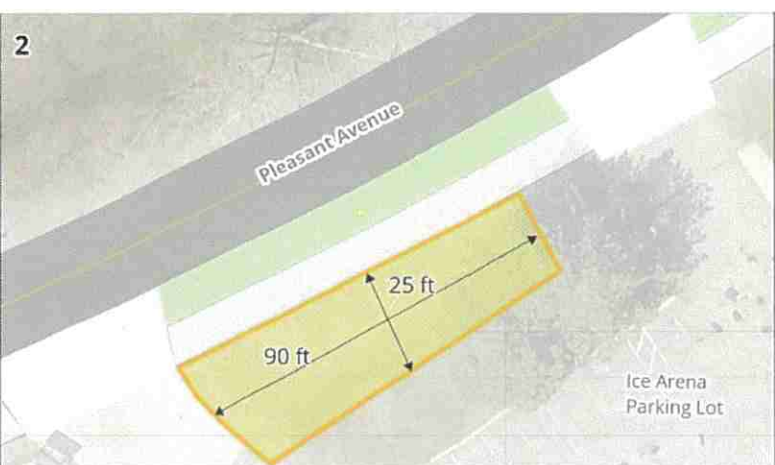
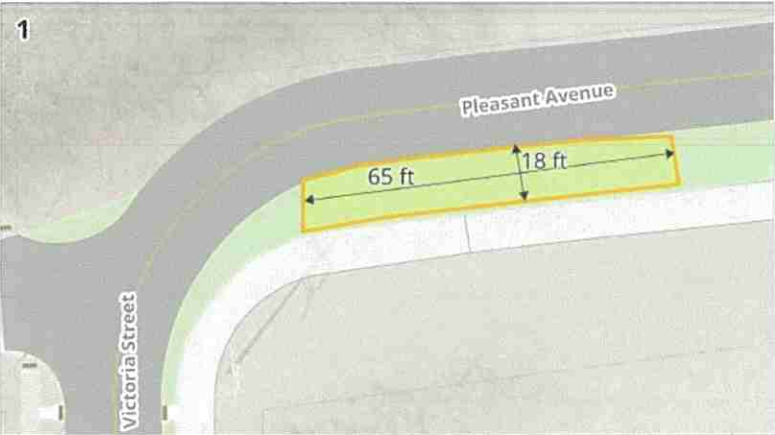

THE NEW WEST 7TH CORRIDOR: DOWNTOWN SAINT PAUL TO MALL OF AMERICA

A multimodal concept with bus rapid transit

After many years of study and community feedback, the City of Saint Paul, Metro Transit, MnDOT, and partners are shifting to a transportation improvement plan for the West 7th corridor that includes Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) while enhancing all existing travel modes in the area.

CONCEPT OVERVIEW

The concept is a transformative vision for the West 7th corridor that includes investment in every mode of travel. The concept includes:

- + Generational investment in West 7th Street
- + Fast, frequent, and reliable BRT line with transit priority treatments
- + Sidewalks and pedestrian streetscape enhancements
- + On-street parking at key locations
- + New regional multi-use trail on the nearby railroad spur

CONCEPT STATUS

This concept is still in the development stage and will be improved with the communities who use and know the corridor best. With the combined effort of the City of Saint Paul, Metro Transit, MnDOT, other partners, and the community, the transitway could open for service as soon as the early 2030s.

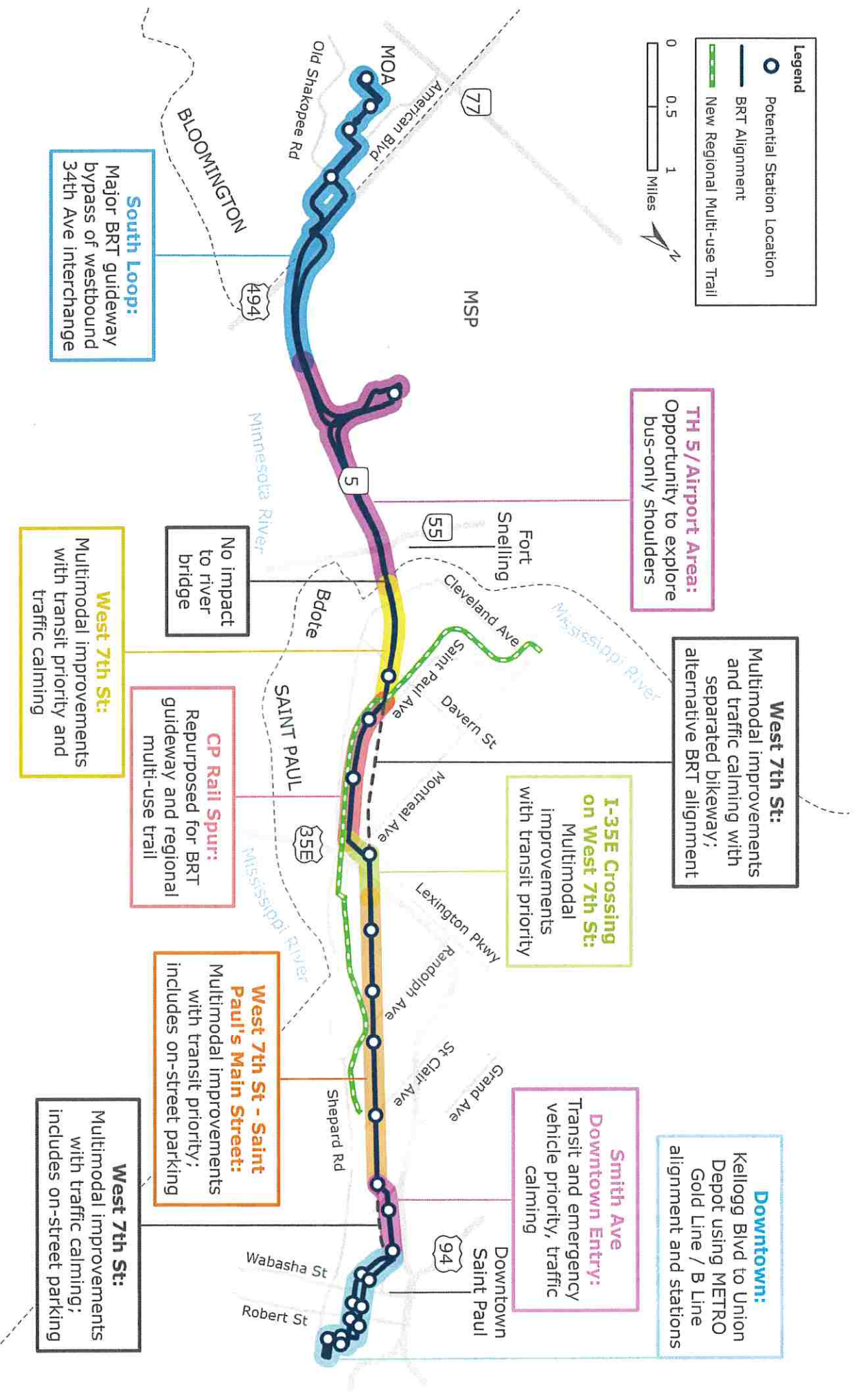

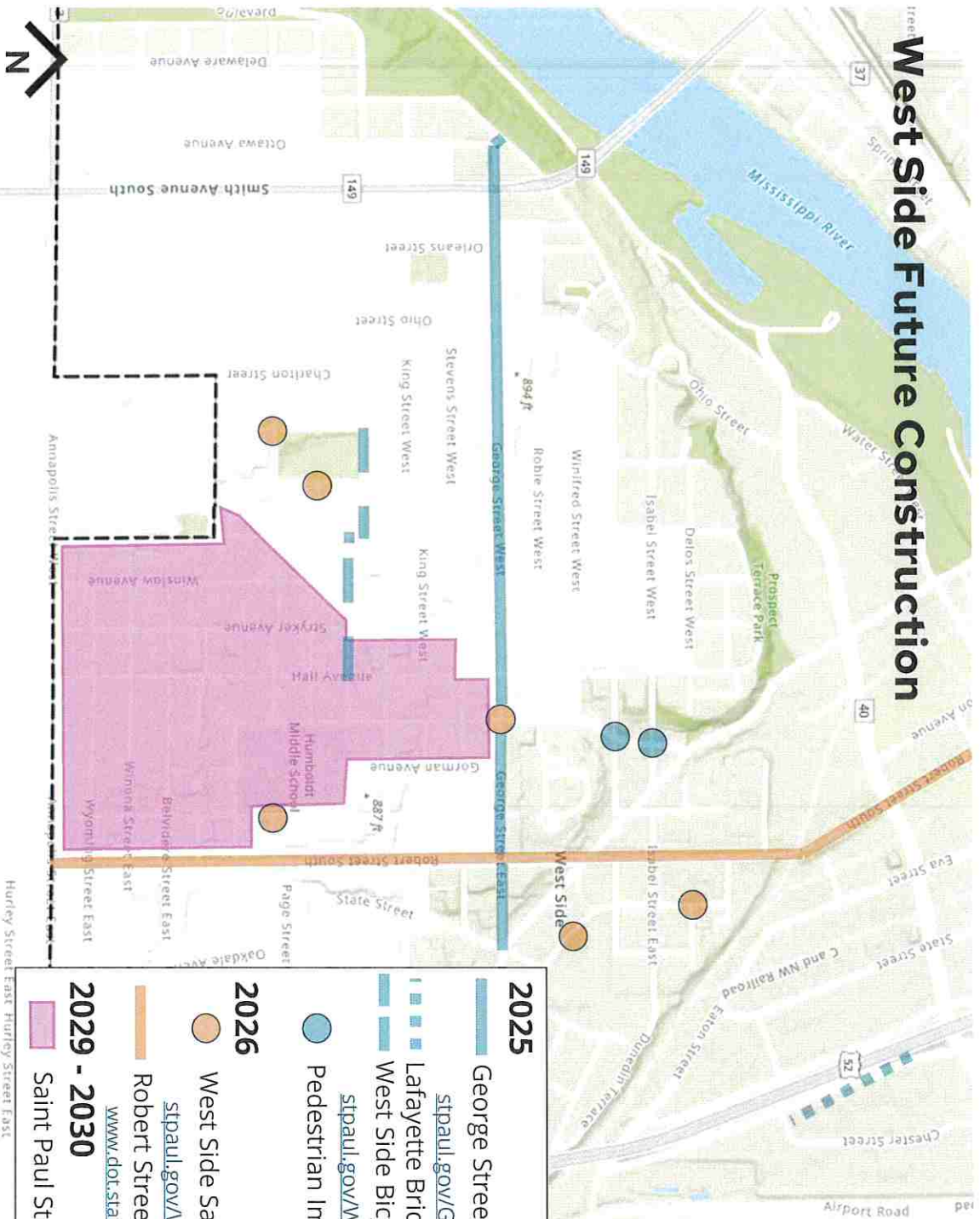

Saint Paul Streets Reconstruction

Robert St., St. Paul

Project description

MnDOT is planning significant improvements to Robert St. between Annapolis St. and Kellogg Blvd. This project will repair and replace roadway pavement and sidewalks and improve safety in the corridor. Construction will likely happen between 2026 and 2029. As we develop the engineering designs, we are focusing on creating a safer Robert St. for everyone – whether walking, bicycling, rolling, using transit or driving.

Design and safety features

- Converting Robert St. to a **three-lane road** throughout the project area, with one traffic lane in each direction and a center turn lane.
- **Medians** along Robert St. to improve safety by shortening pedestrian crossings and calming traffic speeds.
- A **two-way separated bike lane** on the east side of Robert St. from Cesar Chavez St. to Kellogg Blvd. to make travel safer.
- **Parking bays** at select locations along the corridor to rightsize parking with demand, based on the results of a recent parking study and conversations with business owners.
- A **roundabout at Robert, State and Sidney streets** to make it safer and easier for cars to turn left onto Robert St. and to reduce speeding, making it easier for pedestrians to cross the street.
- **Deactivating and potentially removing the signal at Curtice St.** A different form of intersection control would be installed for pedestrian safety. Traffic data shows the number of vehicles traveling through the intersection may not support a signal.
- Design for the **viaduct between State St. and Cesar Chavez St.** is underway.

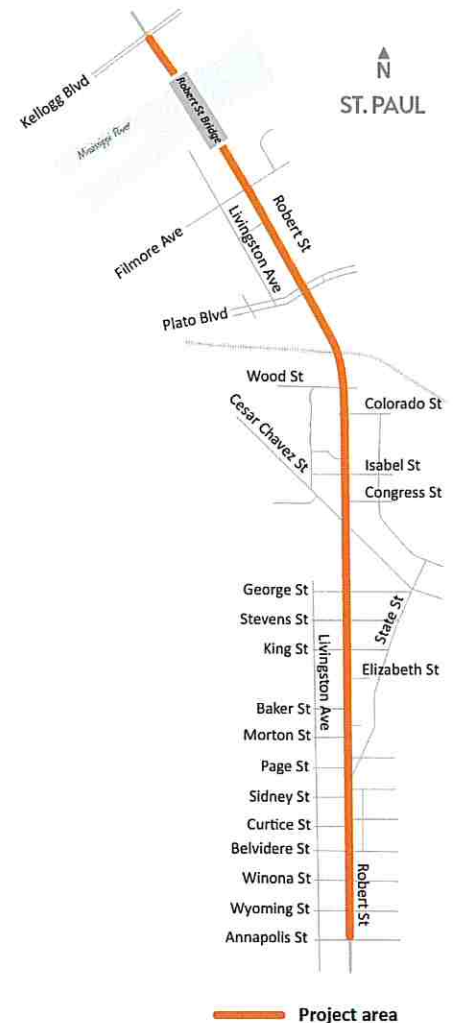

Robert St., St. Paul

Descripción del proyecto

MnDOT está planeando mejoras significativas en Robert St. entre Annapolis St. y Kellogg Blvd. Este proyecto reparará y reemplazará el pavimento de la calle y las banquetas, y mejorará la seguridad en la ruta. La construcción probablemente ocurrirá entre 2026 y 2029. A medida que desarrollamos los diseños de ingeniería, nos estamos enfocando en crear una Robert St. más segura para todos – ya sea caminando, en bicicleta, en silla de ruedas, usando el transporte público o conduciendo.

Características de diseño y seguridad

- Convertir Robert St. en una **carretera de tres carriles** en toda el área del proyecto, con un carril de tráfico en cada dirección y un carril central para girar.
- **Separador vial** a lo largo de Robert St. para mejorar la seguridad al acortar los cruces peatonales y calmar las velocidades del tráfico.
- **Un carril para bicicletas bidireccional y separado** en el lado este de Robert St. desde César Chávez St. hasta Kellogg Blvd. para hacer el viaje más seguro.
- **Bahías de estacionamiento** en ubicaciones seleccionadas a lo largo de la ruta para ajustar el estacionamiento a la demanda, basándose en los resultados de un estudio reciente de estacionamiento y conversaciones con dueños de negocios.
- **Una glorieta en las calles Robert, State y Sidney** para que sea más seguro y fácil para los autos girar a la izquierda hacia Robert St. y para reducir la velocidad, haciendo más fácil para los peatones cruzar la calle.
- **Desactivar y potencialmente remover la señal en Curtice St.** Se instalaría una forma diferente de control de intersección para la seguridad peatonal. Los datos de tráfico muestran que la cantidad de vehículos que atraviesan la intersección puede no justificar una señal.
- El diseño para el **viaducto entre State St. y César Chávez St.** está en curso.

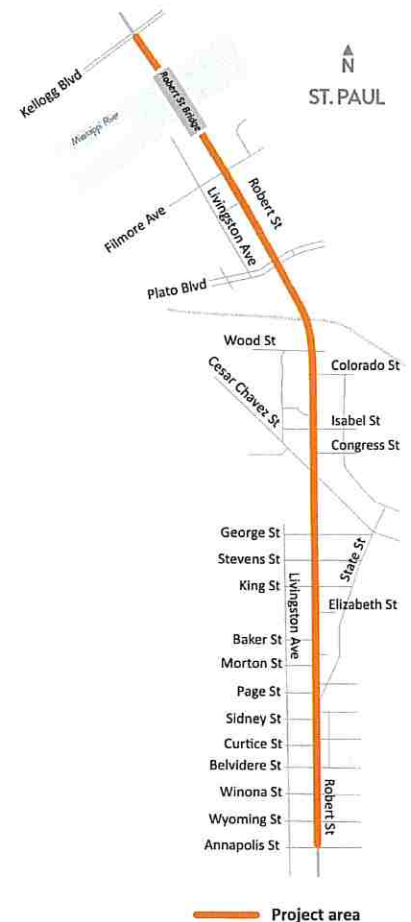

ROBERT ST. FINAL DESIGN

CHANGES MADE BASED ON COMMUNITY INPUT

In fall 2024, MnDOT shared a proposed design for Robert St. focused on improving safety for everyone – whether walking, bicycling, rolling, using transit or driving. We received comments from hundreds of community members and incorporated this feedback in the final design.

The images from the design layout are current as of April 18, 2025. We continue to revise the concept plans and will post any changes to our project website (mndot.gov/metro/projects/robertstreet).

PEDESTRIAN SAFETY

BIKING

What we heard:

- More property owners along Robert St. from Cesar Chavez St. to Kellogg Blvd. like bike lanes than oppose them. Several business owners consider it beneficial to have a safe way for bikers to access their business.
- We heard from two property owners who are opposed to bike lanes because they are concerned about potential impacts to on-street parking.
- The remaining property owner feedback is mixed – “Not opposed to it, but don’t see the need for it either” or “It’s a good idea but I’m concerned this will create conflicts with pedestrians.”

What we did about it:

- We added parking back in near Cesar Chavez St. and from Morton St. to Elizabeth St./Baker St. where feasible. We are continuing to evaluate options to add parking back in. We will revise the final design and post any changes to the website.

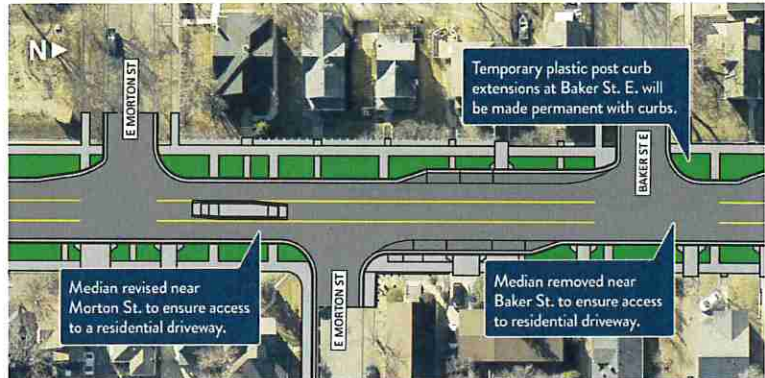
MEDIANS

What we heard:

- Some people are concerned about medians leading to dangerous U-turns or creating other unintended challenges.
- Some property owners were concerned about the impact of medians on their driveways.

What we did about it:

- Medians are intended to provide safer crossing opportunities for pedestrians and help reduce travel speeds on the road. We are looking to place them appropriately on Robert St. to serve this function.
- We revised median designs at Morton and Baker streets to reduce impacts to driveways while still providing improved pedestrian crossings.



CURTICE ST.

What we heard:

- Some people shared that the signal at Curtice St. helps regulate traffic on Robert St., so they want to keep it.

What we did about it:

- Curtice St. does not have the traffic volumes to support a traffic signal. When traffic signals are installed at low-volume intersections, they can actually increase crashes compared to using stop signs.
- We will test this change by turning off the Curtice St. signal a year ahead of project construction before deciding whether to permanently remove it and install another form of intersection control. Alternatives might include rapid flashing beacons for pedestrians, lighting, a median refuge island, and/or enhanced pavement markings and signing. We will study the appropriate crossing treatment to meet the needs of the community and encourage pedestrian safety.



TRAFFIC LAYOUT

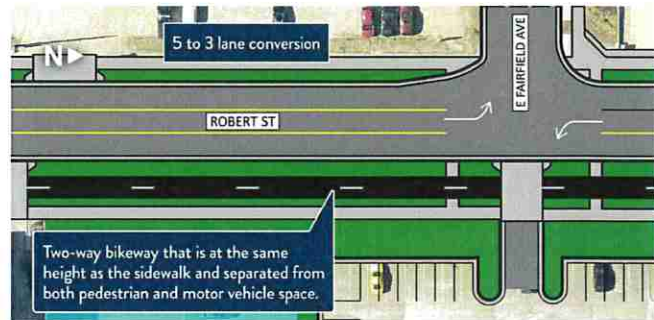
ROBERT ST. BETWEEN PLATO AND FILLMORE

What we heard:

- Some people shared general concerns about how these changes could negatively impact traffic on Robert St.
- We also heard that some people find it hard to turn on Robert St. from stop sign-controlled streets.

What we did about it:

- The improvements included in the final design will help improve traffic on Robert St. by:
 - Promoting slower travel speeds. In addition to improving overall safety, this will also make it easier to turn left onto Robert St. Our goal is to design the street for 25 miles per hour to improve safety and traffic flow.
 - Designing Robert St. based on current traffic volumes and planning for future growth.



PARKING

What we heard:

- Most property owners are not concerned about the loss of on-street parking because they have lots, alleys or driveways/garages.
- Some property owners did express concerns, including a business near Cesar Chavez St. and those located from Morton St. to Elizabeth St./Baker St.



What we did about it:

- We added parking back in near Cesar Chavez St. and from Morton St. to Elizabeth St./Baker St. where feasible. We continue to evaluate options to add parking back in. We will revise the final design and post any changes to the website.
- On-street parking makes the road wider and reduces the amount of green space along the corridor, which makes it harder to plant large trees and reduce vehicle speeds. We're trying to strike a balance between parking needs and safety improvements.

BOULEVARDS

What we heard:

- Most people gave us positive feedback about increased boulevard widths.
- Several people also gave ideas about what could go in the boulevard.

What we did about it:

- We have tracked people's ideas for the boulevards. We will start dedicated engagement with the community on these design elements in fall 2025. It will build on and be informed by the West Side Community Organization's "Destination Robert Street" plan.

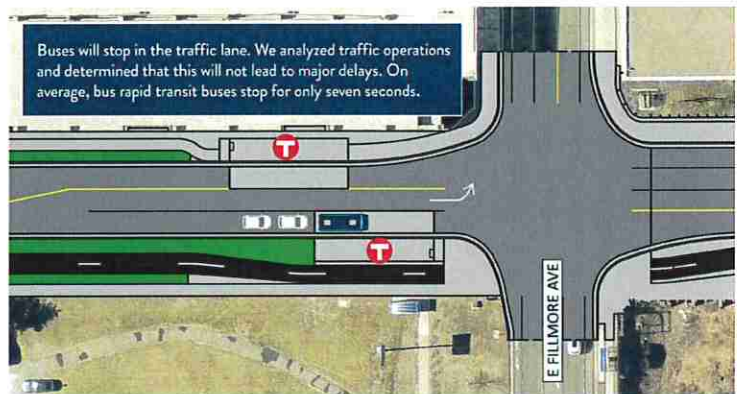
BUS STOPS

What we heard:

- There were concerns about traffic delays due to buses stopping in the traffic lane.

What we did about it:

- We analyzed traffic operations on Robert St. with in-lane bus stops during peak rush hour and found that the in-lane bus stops will not lead to major delays.
- In the West Side Flats, Robert Street doesn't need five traffic lanes to function efficiently. Too many traffic lanes can result in higher speeds and safety concerns.
- With bus rapid transit (BRT), riders pay before they get on the bus, resulting in shorter stops. On average, BRT buses stop for only seven seconds to load and offload passengers.



ROUNDAABOUT AT ROBERT, STATE AND SIDNEY STREETS

What we heard:

- Most people support the idea of a roundabout.
- Some people are concerned about roundabouts causing back-ups or that roundabouts negatively impact pedestrian safety.
- Some wondered if a signal would work here.
- We spoke with three of the four property owners who will be affected by this roundabout (we are still trying to connect with the fourth property owner). They like the idea of the roundabout. Where they have property-specific issues or concerns, we have a solution and are working with them.



What we did about it:

- This roundabout is the best way to improve safety, make it easier for cars to turn left onto Robert St., reduce speeding and make it easier for pedestrians to cross the street.
- We have a lot of data on roundabouts in Minnesota. They are proven to reduce serious crashes and are safer for pedestrians.
- Roundabouts are a better option than adding a traffic signal. There isn't enough traffic at this intersection to justify a signal. Like at Curtice St., if a traffic signal were to be installed here, it could increase crashes and drivers running red lights.

VIADUCT AREA

VIADUCT

What we heard:

- There have been some concerns about adding a “slip lane” or right-turn lane at Cesar Chavez St.
- Feedback around shortening the northbound service road is generally positive.
- We received mixed feedback around removing the connection from the southbound service road to Robert St.

What we did about it:

- The design of the right turn lane at Cesar Chavez St. has been revised as a “pedestrian smart channel” design to improve safety for people walking.
- We plan to disconnect the northbound service road due to existing safety problems at the Cesar Chavez St. intersection.
- In response to community concerns, the southbound connection from the service road to Robert Street will remain. We will re-design the intersection to improve sight lines and pedestrian safety for people crossing at King St.



TREES

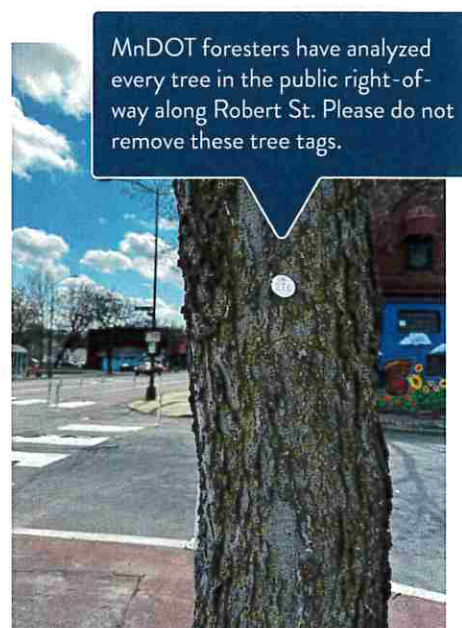
TREES ON ROBERT ST.

What we heard:

- Community members are concerned about losing trees on Robert St. during construction.

What we did about it:

- We are working closely with our forestry experts to understand the health of trees along Robert St. and how natural factors and construction might impact them.
- Our foresters have analyzed each tree in the public right-of-way along Robert St. Some of the trees are in good health, while others are in poor health – in part due to factors like emerald ash borer or poor pruning practices around power lines. They will likely not survive construction.
- We work hard to minimize the impact on trees, but reconstruction projects and those involving utility replacements are harder on root systems because we need to dig deeper and wider to rebuild the road.
- We will replant the corridor with a diverse range of resilient trees appropriate for boulevards, overhead power lines and changing weather patterns.
- The design of Robert St. – along with the trees that are anticipated to be planted along the road – is more conducive to supporting healthy trees in the long term. Wider boulevards allow for larger trees with more room for their root systems to grow.



LEARN MORE ABOUT PLANNED IMPROVEMENTS TO ROBERT ST.

Construction on Robert St. will likely occur in phases from 2026-2029. By building the project in phases, road closures will be limited to the immediate area under construction. We will share more details about construction plans later this year. **Scan the QR code to visit our website.**

CAMBIOS REALIZADOS BASADOS EN LA OPINIÓN DE LA COMUNIDAD

En el otoño de 2024, MnDOT compartió un diseño propuesto para Robert St. enfocado en mejorar la seguridad para todos, ya sea caminando, en bicicleta, en silla de ruedas, utilizando el transporte público o conduciendo. Recibimos comentarios de cientos de miembros de la comunidad e incorporamos esta retroalimentación en el diseño final.

SEGURIDAD PEATONAL

CICLISMO

Lo que escuchamos:

- Más propietarios a lo largo de Robert St., desde César Chávez St. hasta Kellogg Blvd., están a favor de los carriles para bicicletas que en contra. Varios dueños de negocios consideran beneficioso tener una vía segura para que los ciclistas accedan a sus negocios.
- Escuchamos a dos propietarios que se oponen a los carriles para bicicletas debido a preocupaciones por el impacto en el estacionamiento en la calle.
- El resto de la retroalimentación es mixta: “No estoy en contra, pero tampoco veo la necesidad” o “Es una buena idea, pero me preocupa que genere conflictos con peatones”.

Lo que hicimos al respecto:

- Revisamos el diseño de los carriles para bicicletas para evitar conflictos con peatones y agregamos más estacionamiento en lugares como la cuadra entre César Chávez St. e Isabel St. E.

CAMELLÓN

Lo que escuchamos:

- Algunas personas están preocupadas de que los camellones puedan causar giros en U peligrosos u otros problemas no deseados.
- Algunos propietarios expresaron preocupación por el impacto de los camellones en sus entradas de autos.

Lo que hicimos al respecto:

- Los camellones están diseñados para ofrecer cruces más seguros para peatones y reducir la velocidad del tráfico. Estamos buscando colocarlos adecuadamente en Robert St. para cumplir con esta función.
- Revisamos los diseños de los camellones en las calles Morton y Baker para reducir el impacto en las entradas sin dejar de mejorar los cruces peatonales.



CURTICE ST.

Lo que escuchamos:

- Algunas personas compartieron que la señal de tráfico en Curtice St. ayuda a regular el tráfico en Robert St. y quieren mantenerla.

Lo que hicimos al respecto:

- Curtice St. no tiene el volumen de tráfico necesario para justificar un semáforo. Instalar semáforos en intersecciones de bajo tráfico puede aumentar los choques en comparación con el uso de señales de alto.
- Vamos a probar este cambio apagando la señal un año antes del inicio de la construcción. Luego evaluaremos si se elimina permanentemente y se instala otra forma de control de intersección. Las alternativas podrían incluir luces intermitentes rápidas para peatones, iluminación, un refugio central peatonal y/o mejoras en la señalización y marcas viales. Estudiaremos las opciones de cruce apropiadas para cumplir con las necesidades de la comunidad y para promover la seguridad de los peatones.



DISEÑO DEL TRÁFICO

ROBERT ST. ENTRE PLATO Y FILLMORE

Lo que escuchamos:

- Algunas personas expresaron preocupaciones generales sobre el impacto negativo que estos cambios podrían tener en el tráfico en Robert St.
- También escuchamos que algunas personas tienen dificultades para girar hacia Robert St. desde calles con señales de alto.



Lo que hicimos al respecto:

- Las mejoras en el diseño final ayudarán a mejorar el tráfico en Robert St. mediante:
 - El fomento de velocidades más bajas. Además de mejorar la seguridad, esto facilitará girar a la izquierda para entrar a Robert St. Nuestro objetivo es diseñar la calle para 25 millas por hora para mejorar la seguridad y el flujo de tráfico.
 - El diseño de Robert St. basado en volúmenes actuales de tráfico y planificación para el crecimiento futuro.

ESTACIONAMIENTO

Lo que escuchamos:

- La mayoría de los propietarios no están preocupados por la pérdida de estacionamiento en la calle porque tienen lotes, callejones o entradas de auto/cocheras.
- Algunos expresaron preocupaciones, incluyendo un negocio cerca de César Chávez St. y aquellos ubicados entre Morton St. y Elizabeth St./Baker St.



Lo que hicimos al respecto:

- Reincorporamos estacionamiento cerca de César Chávez y desde Morton St a Elizabeth St./Baker St. donde fue posible. Seguimos evaluando opciones para añadir estacionamiento. Revisaremos el diseño final y compartiremos cualquier cambio en el sitio web.
- El estacionamiento en la calle hace la vía más ancha y reduce el espacio verde, lo que dificulta plantar árboles grandes y reducir la velocidad de los vehículos. Buscamos un equilibrio entre las necesidades de estacionamiento y las mejoras de seguridad.

BOULEVARES

Lo que escuchamos:

- La mayoría de las personas dieron comentarios positivos sobre el aumento en el ancho de los boulevares.
- Varios también compartieron ideas sobre qué se podría incluir en ellos.

Lo que hicimos al respecto:

- Hemos registrado las ideas compartidas para los boulevares. Comenzaremos un proceso de participación comunitaria enfocado en estos elementos en el otoño de 2025. Se basará en el plan “Destino Robert Street” de la West Side Community Organization.

PARADAS DE AUTOBÚS

Lo que escuchamos:

- Hubo preocupaciones sobre las demoras causadas por autobuses que se detienen en los carriles de tráfico.

Lo que hicimos al respecto:

- Analizamos el funcionamiento del tráfico en Robert St. con paradas en carril en horas pico y encontramos que las paradas de autobuses en el carril no conllevarán a demoras mayores.
- En el área de West Side Flats, Robert Street no necesita cinco carriles para funcionar eficientemente. Demasiados carriles pueden aumentar la velocidad y la preocupación sobre la seguridad.
- Con el Bus de Tránsito Rápido (BRT), los pasajeros pagan antes de abordar, lo que reduce el tiempo de parada. En promedio los buses de BRT se paran por solo siete segundos para recoger y dejar pasajeros.



ROTONDA EN ROBERT, STATE Y SIDNEY STREETS

Lo que escuchamos:

- La mayoría de las personas apoyan la idea de una rotonda.
- Algunas personas están preocupadas de que la rotonda pueda causar congestionamientos o que afecten negativamente la seguridad peatonal.
- Algunos se preguntaron si una señal funcionaría mejor.
- Hablamos con tres de los cuatro propietarios afectados por esta rotonda (seguimos intentando contactar al cuarto propietario). Les gusta la idea de la rotonda. Donde ellos tienen preocupaciones específicas sobre su propiedad estamos trabajando con ellos en soluciones específicas.



Lo que hicimos al respecto:

- Esta rotonda es la mejor opción para mejorar la seguridad, facilitar los giros a la izquierda para entrar a Robert St., reducir la velocidad y hacerlo más fácil para los peatones para cruzar la calle.
- Tenemos muchos datos sobre rotondas en Minnesota. La información prueba que las rotondas reducen los choques graves y son más seguras para los peatones.
- Las rotondas son una mejor opción que adicionar un semáforo. No hay suficiente tráfico en esta intersección para justificar un semáforo. Como en Curtice St., un semáforo podría aumentar los choques y que los conductores se pasen la luz roja.

ÁREA DEL VIADUCTO

VIADUCTO

Lo que escuchamos:

- Hay preocupaciones sobre agregar un “Carril de giro libre” o carril de giro a la derecha en César Chávez St.
- El acortamiento del camino de servicio norte ha recibido comentarios mayormente positivos.
- Comentarios mixtos sobre la eliminación de la conexión desde el camino de servicio sur hacia Robert St.

Lo que hicimos al respecto:

- El diseño del carril de giro a la derecha en César St ha sido rediseñado como un “canal inteligente peatonal” diseñado para mejorar la seguridad de la gente que ande caminando.
- Planeamos desconectar el camino de servicio norte por problemas de seguridad actuales en la intersección de César Chávez.
- En respuesta a preocupaciones de la comunidad, mantendremos la conexión del sur a Robert St. Rediseñaremos la intersección para mejorar visibilidad y seguridad peatonal para la gente que cruce en King St.



ÁRBOLES

ÁRBOLES EN ROBERT ST.

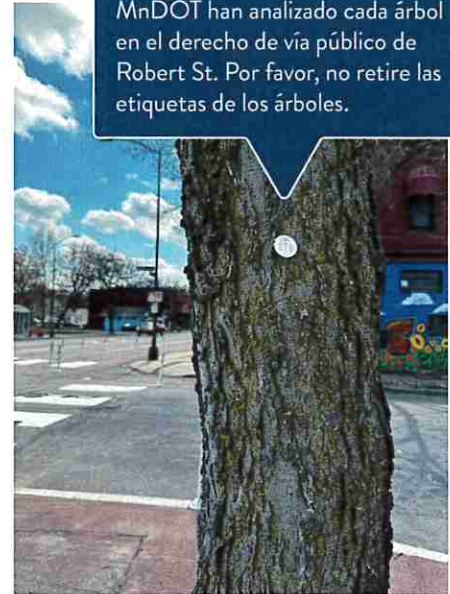
Lo que escuchamos:

- La comunidad está preocupada por la pérdida de árboles durante la construcción.

Lo que hicimos al respecto:

- Estamos trabajando cercanamente con expertos para evaluar la salud de los árboles a lo largo de Robert St. y cómo los factores naturales y la construcción podrían afectarlos.
- Nuestros forestales han analizado cada árbol en el derecho de vía público a lo largo de la calle Robert. Algunos árboles están en buen estado de salud, mientras que otros se encuentran en malas condiciones, en parte debido a factores como la infestación del barrenador esmeralda del fresno (emerald ash borer) o prácticas deficientes de poda alrededor de las líneas eléctricas. Es probable que estos árboles no sobrevivan a la construcción.
- Trabajamos por minimizar el impacto en los árboles, pero los proyectos de reconstrucción y aquellos que implican el reemplazo de servicios públicos afectan más a los sistemas de raíces, ya que es necesario excavar más profundo y de manera más amplia para reconstruir la calle.
- Replantaremos la vía con una variedad diversa y resistente de árboles, adecuada para boulevares, líneas eléctricas y climas cambiantes.
- El diseño de Robert St. y los árboles que serán plantados a lo largo de la calle favorecerán la salud de los árboles a largo plazo. Boulevares más anchos permitirán árboles más grandes con más espacio para el crecimiento de sus raíces.

Los expertos forestales de MnDOT han analizado cada árbol en el derecho de vía público de Robert St. Por favor, no retire las etiquetas de los árboles.

The new METRO G Line

Faster transit is coming to the Rice Street and Robert Street corridor

The METRO G Line is a planned bus rapid transit (BRT) line that will provide faster and more reliable transit service on Rice Street and Robert Street. BRT buses and stations are comfortable and easy to use.

The METRO G Line will travel along Market Place Drive and Little Canada Road in Little Canada; Rice Street in Little Canada, Maplewood, Roseville, and St. Paul; Cesar Chavez Street and State Street in St. Paul; Robert Street in St. Paul and West St. Paul, and Mendota Road in West St. Paul and Inver Grove Heights.

Metro Transit plans to construct and open the G Line in two phases to better coordinate with planned road construction on the corridor.

Phase 1 will include the northern portion of the G Line from Little Canada Transit Station to Robert & Kellogg in downtown St. Paul.

Phase 2 will include the southern portion of the G Line from Robert & Fillmore to the Dakota County Northern Service Center.

Bus Rapid Transit: A faster, more reliable, and more comfortable ride

Metro Transit is developing a network of bus rapid transit lines across the Twin Cities region. This cost-effective way to speed up service substantially improves the customer experience and has proven to attract more people to use transit regularly.



Neighborhood-scale stations with amenities

Stations are equipped with features for a safe and comfortable experience, similar to light rail.

- NexTrip, real-time arrival and departure information
- On-demand heat, security lighting, and emergency communications
- Near-level boarding – walk onto the bus without having to climb steps
- Bike parking and trash receptacles

Limited stops, frequent service

BRT will operate every 10 minutes for most of the day with stations every 1/3 to 1/2 mile.

As planning progresses on each line, Metro Transit will evaluate the market and demand for additional local bus service in areas along the corridor.



Pre-boarding fare payment for faster stops

For faster boarding through all doors, BRT buses don't have fareboxes. Customers will purchase a ticket or tap a Go-To Card at the station, just like light rail. Fare inspections will be conducted by Metro Transit police.

New infrastructure to increase speed

In addition to the improved stations and wider stop spacing, Metro Transit and its partners are exploring options to make these BRT lines even faster. Options include:

- Signal priority to keep moving; buses could "ask" for early or extended green lights at certain intersections
- Bus-only lanes along portions of the line to keep buses out of traffic

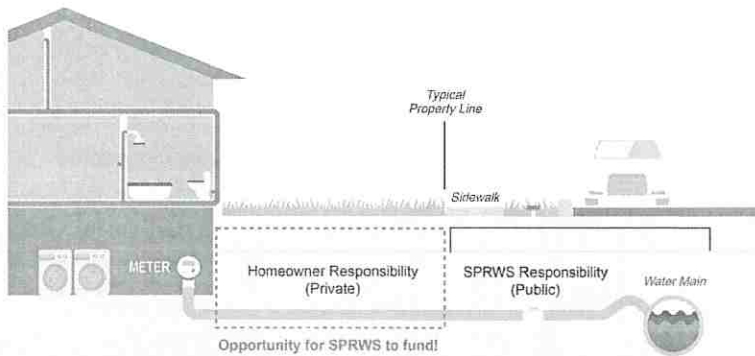

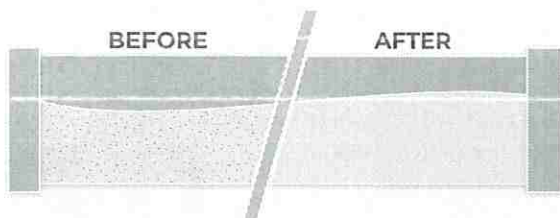

4. To get the pipes underground, crews will dig up 2-3 areas—one in the street, one in the boulevard, and possibly one in your front yard. We will minimize damage to landscaping and private property as best we can.

5. The lead service line is replaced with a copper line. The new line is connected to the water main in the street at one end and your house plumbing at the other.

6. Lead Free SPRWS staff test the new line and run water through it to flush out debris and lead particles.



7. Holes in the yard and street are temporarily (not permanently) restored for safety, giving the ground time to settle.

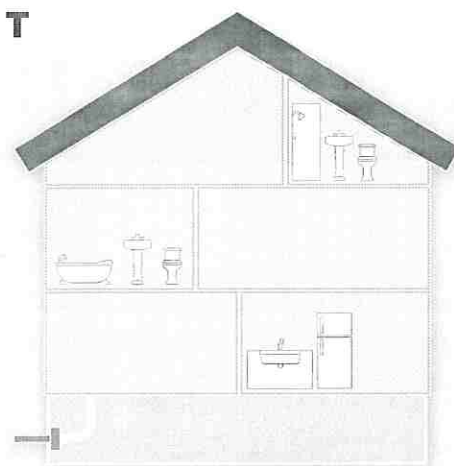

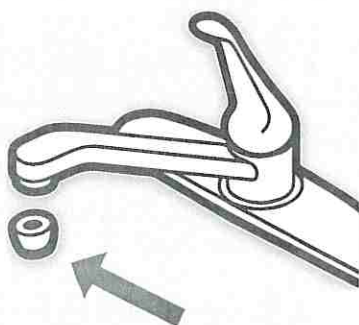
8. Once the service has been replaced and water service has been restored to your home, turn on the faucets throughout the home with cold water. Start with the faucet at the lowest level and work your way up to the highest level. This process will flush all of the water lines in the building.

After 30 minutes of running the water, shut off faucets starting at the lowest level and working your way up.

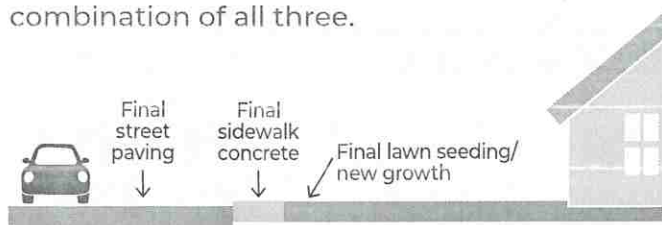


9. Remove faucet aerators/shower heads and clean out any particles that may have accumulated there.

The aerator is usually at the tip of the faucet and can be screwed off in order to clean it.



11. Crews will return within 120 days to restore the holes in the yard, sidewalk, and street to prework conditions with seeding, concrete, paving, or a combination of all three.



10. For the next 30 days, run cold water through the plumbing in your home for 5 minutes each morning (or after an extended period of no water usage) before drinking or cooking.



Taking a shower or bath will flush your lines.

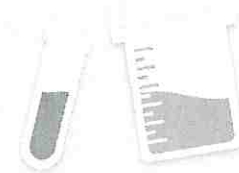
REMEMBER: Always use cold water from the tap for drinking, cooking, and baby formula preparation.



The Environmental Protection Agency recommends using a pitcher filter certified to NSF 53 standards for 6 months after replacing a lead service line.

Follow the manufacturer's instructions included with your filter packaging to know when and how to change the filter cartridge.

12. We will offer a water sample test 3-6 months after replacement to check lead levels.

Rent Stabilization Quarterly Report

1st Quarter 2024

Residential Rent Increases

Residential rent increases are limited to no more than 3% in a 12-month period without City approval. Landlords who would like to increase the rent by more than 3% must apply to the City using one of the rent increase exceptions listed below.

Self-Certification

For rent increase exceptions between 3% and 8% (evaluated annually).

Staff Determination

For rent increase exceptions greater than 8%.

Just Cause Vacancy

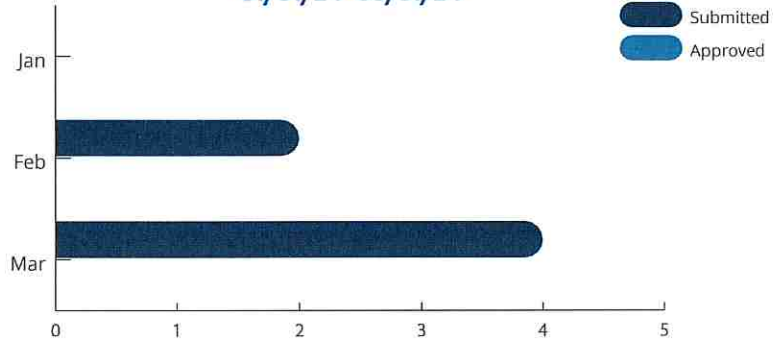
For rent increase exceptions equal to the Consumer Price Index plus 3%.

Just Cause Vacancy provisions in the Rent Stabilization Ordinance and rules are relevant for landlords who seek an increase exception when a residential rental unit is vacated for Just Cause, such as for those reasons listed below (not an all-inclusive list):

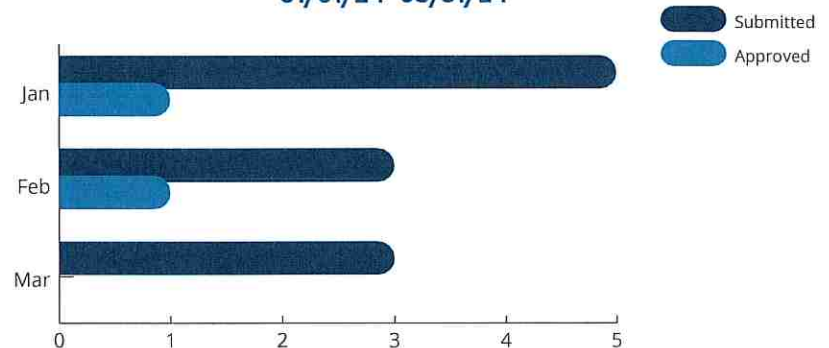
- Non-payment of rent

Landlords who seek a Just Cause Vacancy increase must demonstrate that a residential rental unit was vacated for a Just Cause.

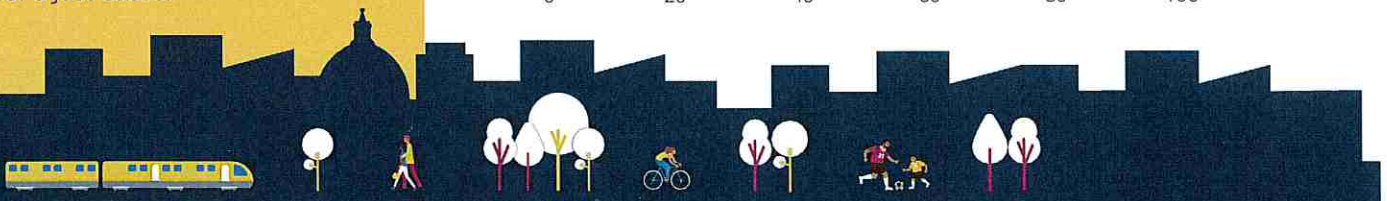
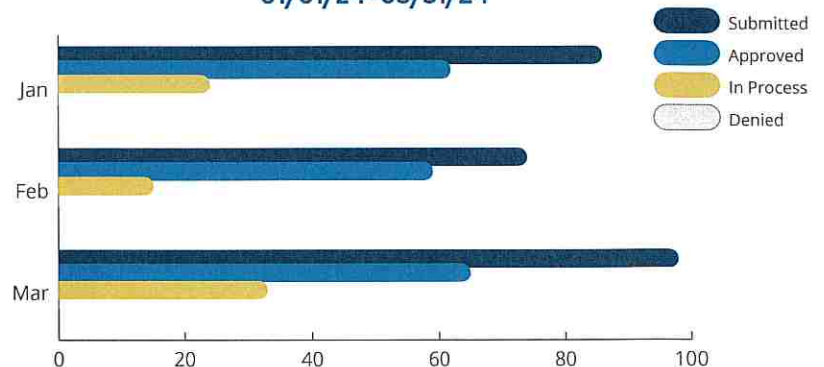
